



### The Founder's Conversation Starter

"We are not equipped to go through this life ALONE." Advian - former foster youth who aged out of the system.

There are many things we do in our life that we wish would just go away - like dust in the wind. But they don't. They linger like wads of gum to the bottom of desks we discover when we revisit a classroom from our childhood. Some of those dark experiences were of our own making, and some were not. Human beings have a unique function in our brains - regret - which when working properly helps compel us to improve, to learn from mistakes and grow! This is the power of positive regret, as I call it. But when there is regret without hope, it is cancerous and destructive as it morphs into shame. Regret is a remarkable reminder that we are not born done, rather, we are birthed into a process of rising from lying helplessly on our backs, to knees to wobbly feet to running miles in record times, if not in practice, in dreams. To benefit from regret, we must embrace the promise that we are co-creators of our lives and there is a way to excel uniquely and wonderfully as members of one great human family. "We are not equipped to go through this life ALONE," says Adrian. And it is true.

On September 12, Father-Con will host our 2nd Power Luncheon to raise funds for our significant work to work towards the aim of every child having a healthy father or father figure in their lives to encourage, inspire and instruct them. We are deeply honored to have as our keynote speaker, Dr. Gregory Williams, author of the breathtaking autobiographical story of his life, Shattered by the Darkness. Dr. Williams was sexually abused by his father for 12 formative years, faced denial and rejection when he revealed his abuse, and after demanding the abuse end, suffered the complete withdrawl of his fathers attention. He knows better than most, how significant a fathers presence and acceptance are, and what it feels like when denied. Gregory knows all too well about ACEs (Adverse Childhood Experiences) and has healed to help heal others. It is reported that somewhere between 3.8% to 7.6% of boys have experienced CSA Child Sexual Abuse. Most keep it silently stuck on the bottoms of their desks, until those sticky wads become dislodged in marriages or as fathers. Dr. Williams powerfully demonstrates the liberation of redemption and the ability of the human spirit to



overcome. What could have been irreparable harm done to him twisted into shame and self-blame, has become a testimony of hope needed by millions of boys and men with whom we share our homes and communities. Let us learn to be a safe place for healing - let us all contribute to breaking the cycle of sorrow residing in silence and darkness. Your attention at the right moment, could mean the difference of a lifetime.



**Full Circle** 

In our country 200 years ago during the "Industrial Revolution, immigrants came to America to find new hope for themselves and their families. Unfortunately, there were not enough jobs, food, and housing to care for the estimated 5 million people that landed on our shores during that time. Families were forced to spend every waking hour just to try to survive and many times did not have enough for themselves and their children too. So, they desperately looked to our country for help.

Take a moment to think about it.

You're a child and you are moved from everything you know in the country you were born and raised and brought to a strange new land by way of ship on the open seas facing sickness, fear, danger and death. Only to come to a new land with hordes of others just like yourself with nothing but a dream. But that soon dream became a nightmare for many children that had to be placed in orphanages apart from their families.

A shortage of staff, abuse, sickness and death would soon force orphanages to close, due to the huge influx of immigrant children. So now families are left to their own devices to try to survive.

At that time a gentleman by the name of Reverent Charles Loring Brace created The Children's Aid Society to help these children, common referred to as "street rats". It wasn't long before he realized that he had to get them out of New York. So, he created "The Orphan Trains" to find these children homes in the Midwest, where they could have a chance at having a normal childhood, until they could be returned to their families.

This was the beginning of foster care system as we know it. It is estimated that somewhere between 200,000-400,000 immigrant children were placed in homes in the midwestern states from 1850-1929 through The Orphan Trains.

Well, here we are again!

As we see in the news, families from all over the world are fleeing their countries to come to the U.S. and looking for help.

It has gotten to the point where the influx of unaccompanied minors requires that we do what we did 200 years ago-

"Ask American families to open their homes to care for these children."

In my experience as a Director of Family Recruitment for FosterAll, it is very clear that some cultures are not attracted to the prospect of fostering American children. My hope and prayer is that these same cultures would now consider fostering a child from their own country of origin that has been placed on U.S. soil.

It is also my hope and prayer that this will activate The Church and those who are "missions" minded to consider being a missionary in their own home by taking in these children. Please take a moment and picture how you would feel being in this situation as a child and a parent. Scared, anxious, depressed, hopeless, helpless, guilty, broken hearted...

You can give hope to a child.
