




From 2024, if you too are **not willing to stay on the sidelines**, join us in the fight of our lives.

New monthly column: Foster-Con

"THE DAD O' COASTER"

As someone who works hard to find safe, loving homes for children in foster care, I'm approached mostly by women. Probably 95%. Why is that? It might be because men are not natural born nurturers. It might be because men are drawn toward ancestry and lineage. It might be because men are protectors and territorial and don't like to invite things into their lives that they can't control. It also might be because they're afraid.

As a man myself, that is not my favorite word. But, afraid of what?

Afraid to not be able to have control. Afraid of the pain that their family will face if the child is reunified with family. Afraid of the pain they will feel. But instead of admitting that fear, we take a deep breath and beat our chests and grunt out, "My tribe!"

For some reason, we think that because a child has our DNA, they are better. We think that we will have more control of how they will turn out. By looking at history and just looking around us, we can see the irony in that, but still in all, we think "our folks" are better than "their folks".

Nothing will heal someone of this faster than when your children hit their "teens".

I'll never forget the day that I looked at my kid and I thought, " Who are you and what have done with my child?"

Parenting is a white-knuckle roller-coaster ride that will have you screaming and shutting your eyes at times. It will come to an end, but it will never throw you off. As crazy as it is, some want to ride it again!

Another funny fear that I hear from both men and women is, "I don't think I can handle it, if the child is taken away." This is funny because, until you've adopted the child, the bio-parent has "first dibs" and that is their child and although it may not be perfect, that really is the best place for the child, emotionally.

It's also funny because, as a parent of biological children as well as foster children, they all fly away! In this generation's culture, they do fly back from time to time, but we all realize that we don't get to keep them.



It's not so funny, because life is uncertain and sadly sometimes even our bio-children are "taken" away from us for reasons that we cannot control.

Whether it's your bio, or foster or adopted child, you get the unique honor of loving, raising and helping a child that needs you. That is the greatest honor bestowed on us as humans.


